

Transferring Entire Projects Folder (to reformat hard drive)

Hi everyone

Since updating my Mac OS to Mojave, it appears the hard drive I have all my Lightworks work on no longer allows me to write it. [It says I have write permission, and that 'staff' and 'everyone', but when I try and change anything about the permissions, it tells me I don't have permission to!] Bit of a pain but I'm thinking I'll copy everything off onto my other external drive, reformat the original, and then transfer back.

Before I do reformat, and potentially lose everything, I just wanted to double check I'd be able to pick up where I left off without issue. Will I have to do anything like locate all the files, sequences, etc. or should it be pretty seamless?

And if anyone has had a similar issue with hard drives, let me know if you know if a workaround!

With default settings, all assets (e.g. projects, user effect, templates, macros, settings, local media), excluding linked media, are located in sub folders of the ~/Lightworks on your local home directory (see schrauber's screenshot earlier). Internally, linked media are represented by small link files in internal media space (~/Lightworks/Media). Not only linked media but also the link files have to be present for proper operations.

If Lightworks finds all your linked media at the same location (/volume/path/filename) on the reformatted drive, it will work as nothing has ever happened.

If linked media has been moved, it's possible to relink them. Lightworks refers to filename.extension when relinking. Renamed files cannot be relinked. To relink moved media, select clips to relink in "Filter.Clips", right-click and execute "Media.Relink missing". This works also for single clips from source viewer, or for clips in the timeline from "Sequence Commands". If something is wrong with your internal media locations, "Media.Repair" instead of

"Media.Relink missing" is shown, then follow the onscreen dialogue.

With default configuration, (only one Media Location, ~/Lightworks/Media) migration to another system can be done in three steps:

1. Install Lightworks on the new system.
2. Move the folder ~/Lightworks to the new system.
3. Attach the external hard drive with linked media, mounted with same volume name.

Of course you can use project backup to migrate projects one by one. It has the benefit that you create a backup of each project, but it takes longer and you have to deal with macros, user effects, templates, and settings separately.

As a side note: It's a good idea to include the entire folder ~/Lightworks in your regular backup routines on OS level, just in case your system drive crashes. I think, OSX Time Machine will do that by default.

Hope that answers all your questions.

If you do it right and include all what's needed, yes, but Time Machine, same as most other dedicated backup systems, keeps versions, incremental or differential backups, some have options to validate the written data by re-reading and comparing with the sources. You don't have all that with manual copies. In general, for regular backups of the system drive manual copy isn't a good solution.

Just to make sure: Before reformatting your external hard drive, copy the entire content to a safe place.

Hello again,

The question is, what does "effective" mean in this context?

A manual copy of a folder, is a manual copy of a folder. If you have one, you're lucky, otherwise you're lost. It helps definitely to save a certain state of your projects or to migrate to another computer.

Time Machine (and similar) is good for almost any kind of disaster recovery of user data, i.e. damaged computer or mass storage, accidentally deleted or modified files. It won't help if your house burns down or the thief grabs your entire computer equipment. You should include your system partition and you can include all internal and external partitions connected to your computer. Using a backup drive/partitions for Time Machine of twice the size of all partitions included in the backup isn't a bad idea, but there are many discussions to be found on the net about "best size";

There's one drive/partition for the backups managed by Time Machine at one time. You can have multiple of those which answers e.g. the questions, how can I archive older backups, what can I do to prevent loss of all my backups if the backup drive crashes, how to extend available space on the backup drive?

Time Machine is more or less set and forget and, from my point of view, the backup strategy is good. You should make yourself familiar with the procedures how to restore, before the disaster happens.
